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Open-access Red Arrows 'fly' in Spain

Spain has embraced open-access competition on its high speed lines with the launch at the end of 2022 of new operator Iryo's Red Arrow trains.

The first commercial services started between Madrid and Barcelona, and Iryo took a party of guests along the Madrid-Valencia corridor in November, with one of its 20 new Frecciarossa ETR 1000 trains making its debut in Spain.

The Iryo consortium, made up of Air Nostrum, Trenitalia and Globalvia, has a licence to operate for the next 10 years and its Red Arrow trains will also serve Seville, Malaga and Alicante.

Iryo will operate 30% of the high speed trains on these corridors, and will compete with national rail company Renfe and also with the Spanish branch of SNCF, Ouigo España.

Its main stakeholder Trenitalia operates similar trains in Italy which are licensed to operate in France, Spain and Italy.

Services to Valencia began in December, with Sevilla and Malaga starting in March and Alicante in June.

ALLRAIL, the alliance of rail's new operators, wants competition between different operators on all high-speed rail routes in Europe.

Its secretary general Nick Brooks travelled on Iryo's inaugural service.

He said: "It is great to see how commercially driven open-access services – such as Iryo – are making long-distance rail more attractive and winning travellers away from less sustainable transport modes, namely airlines and cars."

The Frecciarossa train is built by Hitachi-Bombardier, and promoted as having a Spanish heart and Italian style, the highest level of comfort in Spain, as well as the "highest quality" wifi.





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Standstill future for train operator?



The government is expected to grant a new contract to Arriva in October to carry on operating the CrossCountry rail network. Arriva's subsidiary XC Trains Ltd has been running CrossCountry for the past 15 years.

The franchise extension will allow it to run for another four years, with the possibility of increasing it to eight. There are no plans to improve the quality or quantity of services. A value for money review could theoretically lead to further cuts. The 2007 franchise was originally expected to end in 2016 but has been

extended with contracts awarded by the Department for Transport. The existing contract began in October 2020.

CrossCountry operates long-distance services, such as Plymouth to Edinburgh, but provides many crucial inter-city links at Leeds, Birmingham, Reading, Doncaster, Newcastle upon Tyne, Coventry, Bristol, Manchester, Nottingham, Gloucester, Leicester, Glasgow and Cardiff, as well as Stansted airport. There were high hopes in 2007 when the franchise was awarded. The then managing director Andy Cooper welcomed staff from Virgin CrossCountry and Central Trains and promised a fresh vision, more and better trains, high quality service on board, environmentally friendly ways of working and encouraging modal shift to rail. CrossCountry does not manage any stations.

The German national rail operator Deutsche Bahn bought Arriva, which is based in Sunderland, in 2010 for £1.6 billion. DB tried to sell Arriva in 2019 but abandoned the idea after "bids were too low". There have been reports that DB is attempting to revive the sale.

Railfuture is preparing a submission to the Department for Transport on CrossCountry after consulting Railfuture branches.

Julie Boston 1934-2022

Farewell to rail champion Julie

Bristol-based rail campaigners have lost their inspirational activist Julie Boston who died in October.

Friends of the Severn Beach Line was formed in 1995 to protest against line closure threats.

FoSBR's first action was to invite residents to Avonmouth station with buggies and bicycles to show that buses were not a suitable substitute for trains.

Julie picked up the campaign reins with a view to not only saving but improving the train service.

She became a familiar face at Bristol City Council meetings, then later West Of England Combined Authority, making a vocal case for local rail.

In 2007, following pressure from FoSBR and others, Bristol City Council agreed to fund extra services on the Severn Beach line for an initial three years.

Passenger numbers immediately rose by 60%, and double-digit growth continued until Covid.

In 2020, despite the Covid restrictions, Julie and friends managed to celebrate FoSBR's 25th anniversary by organising small group outings by train – the "FoSBR Sixes". In 2021, a long-held ambition was achieved when the Severn Beach Line

Former FoSBR Chair Bernard Lane said: "Julie inspired many people to act. I would not have got involved if it was not for her and her encouragement. "Her determination saved local lines and services and led to the start of half-hourly local services."

Current FoSBR chair Rob Dixon said: "Farewell Julie! We will miss your stubbornness, energy and imaginative campaigning spirit.

"FoSBR, now known as Friends of Suburban Bristol Railways, will continue to campaign for rail at the core of an integrated transport network for Bristol, Bath and the West of England."
