What is a railway for? How can the railway meet the needs of its customers and get more of them?

'What do we want the railways to look like in the future?' The railway needs to understand and influence what politicians want from it, including how to structure it to make it much more effective. This must be achieved when money is tight, industrial relations are 'challenging', performance is regularly awful and current services & fares often don't meet customer needs.

Where should the focus of campaigners for a bigger, better, railway be? What can justify money being spent? – either on day-to-day support or on investment – and how can best use be made of the money already being spent?

The railway can be a highly effective contributor to decarbonisation, to levelling up and as part of many wider initiatives – but only if it is successful in attracting passengers and freight to use the railway. The post Covid railway can no longer rely on commuters who "have" to travel to work each day – who can replace them?

Our conference provides an opportunity to pause and reflect on this – By being an in-person event there will be plenty of opportunity to meet and network with others who are interested in the rail industry. This will allow us to better focus our energies on ideas that can influence those with money and policy making powers.
