ST IVES LINE DEVELOPMENTS

The Branch has now seen the full preliminary report produced by the County Council on re-opening the line. It confirms our view (see last RailEast) that the cost estimate is indulgent. In response, and based on the Report's figures, the Branch has produced its own assessment, which indicates that costs might be reduced to around flom without imperilling safety or viability. We have also disputed the low number of users predicted for the line. Our views are shared by many councillors across the political spectrum.

The County has agreed to review the figures, and have asked British Rail to scrutinise some of the costs and the feasibility of using the existing track. The outcome of these deliberations will be discussed by the County's Transportation Committee on March 24. Before then the RDS expect to meet Council officials for further talks.

In the meantime, RDS is holding a public meeting at the St Ives Free Church Hall on 10 March starting at 8pm. Please attend if you can, and do please write to your Councillor in support of the re-opening.

JAMES APSEY

It is with great sadness that we have learnt of the sudden death, in January, of James Apsey who was a very active member of RDS for many years. Serving on the Railwatch editorial board and other committees, he was, in all his RDS work and as Chairman of the East Norfolk Travellers Association, a tireless and effective campaigner who will be greatly missed. His funeral was attended by a number of RDS members including General Secretary, Trevor Garrod.

THE AGE OF THE TRAIN

Those interested in railway history, especially in how our East Anglian network developed, will be interested in a series of three 4 day courses being given in Norwich by well known railway author, Dr Richard Joby. JUST THE TICKET

A new ticketing scheme for rail travellers from Ipswich has been introduced. Called LINKLINE, it forms part of Ipswich Borough and Suffolk County Council's strategy for promoting greater use of public transport.

On trains from Bury St Edmunds, Lowestoft, Felixstowe or Manningtree, passengers will be able to buy a combined train and bus Day Return ticket to Ipswich for just 20p above the normal rail fare. The facility is free to rail Season Ticket holders. The ticket is valid only on bus services from Ipswich and Ipswich Derby Road stations to the town centre. There are plans to extend the scheme to include rail passengers from Newmarket.

In Cambridge, Network South East tickets allow free access to the frequent Cambus 'Rail Shuttle Service' to the city centre.

We applaud these initiatives and hope they succeed in their intention of enticing more people away from their cars. Indeed, we believe a similar scheme is due to start shortly in Norwich although its publicity will have to improve; a recent visit to Norwich Station revealed a complete absence of bus information.

RAIL NEWS

Travellers from March, who currently have to contend with gaps in the timetable of up to two hours, will be happier people from May when Regional Railways turn the Cambridge-Birmingham service into an hourly event, with every train stopping at March.

British Rail and the Post Office have agreed a new 10 year contract coming into full operation in 1996. The nub of the agreement is that, ultimately, mail will be conveyed by dedicated postal trains only, and not passenger services. Postal activity at every London terminus will transfer to a new road/rail terminal near Willesden

SENTA and the Witham and Braintree RUG are part of a group set up to lobby for a Stansted Airport to Ely rail link. They are hopeful that the EEC, BAA, or both, will help with funding!
